

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A Quick Guide for First Time Exhibitors

Q: Who can enter exhibits?

A: Anyone may enter exhibits in the fair. Check each department listing for details specific for that department. Some departments are limited due to space and staffing.

Q: What does it cost to enter?

A: We don't charge entry fees.

Q: Can I enter exhibits in more than one department?

A: An individual item can only be entered in one department and most departments limit the number of entries from any one individual. Individuals are not, however, limited to the number of departments in which they submit entries. Each department requires an individual entry form.

Q: How far in advance must I enter an exhibit?

A: Deadlines vary for individual departments. Although livestock deadlines are in July, most non-livestock exhibit deadlines are one to seven days before the start of the Fair. Refer to individual department listings.

Q: What types of prizes/awards can I win?

A: The types of awards/prizes vary by department. All departments award stickers or ribbons . Cash premiums will be awarded to all exhibitors.

Q: How are the exhibits judged?

A: Exhibits are judged on their appearance, quality, color and all other attributes that are normally associated with this type of exhibit. The judging is done by experienced judges, who are specialized in that particular field. All judging is "Danish." This means they are judged on their own merits for blue, red or white awards.

Q: Whom do I call if I have questions?

A: Call the Fair Office at 360-795-3480.

Q: What do I do when I bring my exhibit to the Fairgrounds?

A: All exhibits should be taken to the appropriate building; at that point you will receive help from the Superintendent or Clerk. Check front of Fair Premium Book for times and dates. If you don't have an exhibitor number you will need to get one from the Fair Office.

Q: I would like to volunteer at the Fair, who do I contact?

A: It takes hundreds of volunteers to put on a Fair every year. Whether you have a specific area of interest or just want to help out any way that you can, call the Fair office at 360-795-3480, we will be delighted to match you with one of the areas that we need help in.

MAKING ENTRIES

1. Completed ENTRY FORMS for animals (dairy, beef, horses, sheep swine, goats, poultry, rabbits, cavies, dogs and cats) must be submitted to the Fair Office by 4:00 p.m., or manager by July 23, 2021.

2. Each exhibitor will be assigned an exhibitor number at the FAIR OFFICE. Only one exhibitor number per person, use same number for all entries. Exhibitors will be responsible for completing entry form(s) and entry tag(s) and attaching them to or near the exhibit. The completed entry form(s) for all entries are to be turned in to the superintendent for the department in which the entry is made. One department and one division per entry form.

3. AGE GROUPS

PRESCHOOL--Up through 4 years of age. Limited to 5 entries per lot number.

YOUTH—5 to 19 years of age or just graduated from high school. Entries to be made in Youth Building and various Barns only: FFA until age 23; 4-H Kindergarten through 19 years.

ADULT—19 to 60 years of age.

SENIOR CITIZENS—GA—Grand Adult, 60 years of age and over.

4. Washington State Law, January 2012, requires Dog, Cat and pet Ferrets to have current rabies shots. Proof of vaccinations required. All dog exhibitors must submit their entry forms along with Rabies, DHLP and Parvo Certificates on the day their exhibits are due at the fairgrounds. Proof of vaccinations required.

5. Entry blanks may be obtained by writing or calling the manager, at the fairgrounds, and from the County Extension Office prior to the Fair.

6. Exhibitors must take the name of their entry from the premium list, enter the same under the names as they are given, using the exact language of the premium list given the department, division, class and lot on an entry blank furnished for this purpose by the Fair.

7. Entries must be entered in the name of the owner, maker or grower whose exhibitor number must be written on the entry form and tags. Deception as to the ownership, manufacturer or production, shall result in forfeiting all claims to premiums or other awards.

8. If it is ascertained that an exhibit is improperly entered as to department, division, class, lot or description, the exhibitor must correct it before any award is made.

9. Professionals in Open Class, except for livestock are to place a P after lot number and these entries will be exempt from special awards. PROFESSIONALS ARE THOSE WHO SELL THEIR CRAFTS OR HOBBIES OR TEACH CLASSES FOR PAY and derive more than 25% of their income from the sale of items they are exhibiting.

10. NOTE-PREMIUM CHECKS VOID AFTER 45 DAYS.

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

NOTE: Exhibitors are requested to study the rules carefully as they will be rigidly enforced. Failure to follow the rules and regulations will result in disqualification.

RULE 1.

The General supervision of the grounds, the entire exhibition, and police regulations and control of the entrance and the exit gates are vested in the officers and manager of the fair.

RULE 2.

The manager of the fair reserves the final and absolute right to interpret or change these rules and regulations and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of/or incident to the fair. The manager reserves the right to allow animals on Fairgrounds before 4:00 p.m. Wednesday if necessary. The Fair Board will not be responsible for holding clubs, organizations and peoples private funds in the Fair Office during fair.

RULE 3.

The Fair Board and/or manager shall appoint all superintendents, clerks, watchmen and judges who shall be under the direct supervision of the manager.

RULE 4.

The division superintendent(s) shall have general supervision of all articles and animals on exhibit in their area(s), and are responsible for the management of the same.

RULE 5.

A fairgrounds watchman will be on duty all night, and a strict watch will be kept. Any losses or mutilations of exhibits should be reported to the manager promptly.

RULE 6.

No special entries for prizes will be allowed after the premium book has been printed except as allowed by the fair manager.

RULE 7.

Points may vary according to size and work article entails. Points will be determined by management.

RULE 8.

Articles must have been made in the current year and articles will not be permitted to compete for premium points more than one year. Management reserves the right to reject any entries offered.

RULE 9.

Exhibitors must at all times give the necessary attention to whatever they may have on exhibition and be responsible for removing their exhibits at the proper time at the close of the fair. The management will use every precaution, but will not be responsible for loss or damage.

RULE 10.

Exhibitors must prepare and decorate their own booths. The fair board can neither furnish material nor labor for preparing space for exhibits or commercial booths nor can be responsible in any way for the same.

RULE 11.

Decorative material must be fireproof. Flammable material



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will not be allowed. Greenery must be dipped or sprayed with a solution of nine ounces borax and four ounces of boric acid in one gallon of water.

RULE 12.

Articles entered for a single premium cannot compete in a display or collection. Articles in a collection or display cannot be entered in separate or individual premiums. The exceptions of this rule are get-of-sire, produce of dam, breeders of young herd, best 3 females and best uddered cow and dairy club herd classifications in the dairy, goat and sheep classes.

RULE 13.

Regardless of competition in any class, the animal(s) or article(s) will be judged DANISH—judged on its own merit(s).

RULE 14.

All ribbons and awards will be given at the judges discretion. No premium points will be paid for Best of Show or any type of Champion or Reserve or any rosette ribbon.

RULE 15.

Any person interfering with the judge during the adjudications shall forfeit the right to the premiums and all officers, superintendents, helpers and exhibitors are required/requested to report any violation of this rule to the manager.

RULE 16.

All premiums will be paid on a point basis with the value per point being determined by the funds available at the close of the fair.

RULE 17.

No animal shall be withdrawn from the fair before the closing day except by special written permission from the manager. Any animal taken away without permission before the close of the fair will forfeit all premiums. Articles



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

on exhibit can be claimed and picked up after 9:15 p.m. on Saturday. EXHIBITORS MUST PRESENT THEIR CLAIM CHECKS TO THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THEIR DIVISION BEFORE ANY OF THEIR EXHIBITS CAN BE REMOVED FROM THE FAIRGROUNDS.

RULE 18.

ALL PROTESTS must be in writing and must be accompanied by a deposit of \$25.00, which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be filed with the manager within 24 hours after the cause of the protest.

RULE 19.

No person shall be allowed to sell or give away any articles upon the fairgrounds, either during the fair or at any time before the commencement of the same, until the license for the privilege shall have been paid and receipt therefore issued.

RULE 20.

Exhibitors finding mistakes in premiums paid must report this mistake to the fair board within 30 days or no adjustment can be made. All checks void after 45 days. After this allotted time, the account is closed.

RULE 21.

Exhibitors shall be polite, respectful and courteous at all times with the public and each other. Also exhibit good sportsmanship and be a positive role model for all.

RULE 22.

Exhibitors shall uphold an individual's right to dignity, selfdevelopment, and self-direction, will not abuse any exhibitor or participant by physical or verbal means, and will report such abuse to Fair Manager, if observed.

RULE 23.

Exhibitors conduct, behavior and attitude will be such as to serve as a "role model" for other exhibitors participating and/or attending the Fair.

RULE 24.

Exhibitors attempting to or actually interfering with, annoying, molesting, influencing judges, or acting in an impolite manner, shall be rejected and barred from the show. Misconduct in any manner during the Fair; exhibitor shall forfeit ribbons and cash awards.

RULE 25.

Conflicts between exhibitors shall be resolved by the Fair Manager with a right to appeal of the Fair Manager's decision to the Fair Board. The decision of the Fair Board shall be final.

RULE 26.

No possession of/or drinking of alcoholic beverages or illegal drugs is allowed on the fairgrounds or at any youth activities.

RULE 27.

No staying overnight on Fairgrounds or park is permitted unless authorized by the manager. Camping registration must be filled out in the office by 7 p.m. Wednesday of fair week.

RULE 28

Any exhibitor seen by anyone destroying property or exhibits at the fair should be reported to the manager, at the manager's discretion, they may forfeit their premium money. They must be reported within 24 hours of the incident.

RULE 29.

Professionals in Open Class, except for livestock, are to place a (P) after lot number and are exempt from special

awards. PROFESSIONALS ARE THOSE WHO SELL THEIR CRAFTS OR HOBBIES OR TEACH CLASSES FOR PAY THAT DERIVE 25% OF THEIR INCOME FROM THE ITEMS THEY ARE EXHIBITING. No advertisements allowed.

RULE 30.

Entries may be arranged by residents of other counties when and if the space is available July 30, for animals.

RULE 31.

To show or enter livestock such as beef, dairy, horses, goats, swine and sheep, the exhibitor must be determined by the superintendent(s) and/or Fair Management to be in complete control and management of said animal.

RULE 32.

Bedding for all livestock exhibits will be furnished by the fair management. Any other material must be furnished by the exhibitors, including feed, except where otherwise stated. i.e. poultry, rabbits.

RULE 33.

All exhibit stalls/pens must be clean before leaving the fair or forfeit premium money.

RULE 34.

All rabbits exhibited must have a permanent ear number for identification purposes and this number must be recorded on the entry form and tag.

RULE 35.

No whole male goats (bucks) over 10 months of age may be exhibited at the fair.

RULE 36.

No female dogs in season may be entered unless she is



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under medication so as not to be attractive to other dogs or in doggy pants, etc.

RULE 37.

There shall be no dogs or cats allowed on Fairgrounds except those that are entries in the dog and cat shows. All dogs and cats must be kept on a leash while on the fairgrounds and cannot be taken near the livestock nor be allowed to enter into any livestock or other exhibit building except for demonstrations or judging. No dog or cat shall be left unattended, neither staked, crated, benched or otherwise left unattended: the exhibitor or a competent person must remain with the dog or cat at all times. Exhibitors are solely responsible for the conduct of their dogs and cats. Guide dog puppies will be allowed to come to the Fair at any time, wearing identifying guide dog puppy blanket and on a leash. The same applies to service dogs and rescue dogs, must be on a leash.

RULE 38.

Exhibitors are requested to use the designated exercise and grooming areas in order that the arena and buildings may be kept clean and sanitary.

RULE 39.

Animal exhibitors will be limited to three entries per lot per class, unless otherwise stated.

RULE 40.

Abuse of animal(s)—Exhibitor disqualified.

RULE 41.

Animals from same farm may be put together in same pens due to limited number of pens.

RULE 42.

Exhibitors are expected to dress neatly and wear clean clothes. Also observe good rules of conduct in regard to language and general attitude. Exhibitors must wear shoes at all times and dress codes are at the discretion of individual department superintendents.

RULE 43.

Animals not properly fitted for showing will be rejected.

RULE 44.

All 4-H & FFA exhibitors showing animal projects must enter a fitting and showing class with their animal. Exhibitor's are not required to enter conformation, equitation or other types of performance classes. Please notify superintendents if you do not plan to show after you have made your entry. NOTE: Any exhibitor not participating in Fit & Show will be disqualified. Any animal used in 4-H section cannot be used in Open Class, except in group classes.

RULE 45.

Primary members are not eligible for Food Preservation requiring pressure canning or hot water bath canning. They are eligible for food dehydration and freezer jams.

ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

All animals on exhibit at Wahkiakum County Fair must comply with the minimum health requirements for fairs as per the State of Washington Department of Agriculture.

A. Each Fair must have an official fair veterinarian in attendance.

B. Individual health certificates are not required for entry. The fair veterinarian shall issue a blanket health certificate covering all entries to the fair. C. No animal from a quarantined area or premises will be permitted to enter the fair or show.

D. All out-of-state entries must comply with State of Washington import regulations or receive an exemption from the State Veterinarian for exhibitions at this fair only.

E. All out-of-state horses must have negative coggins test within six (6) months. Except for horses from Oregon.

F. Fair veterinarians will inspect all classes of livestock and poultry (including horses, pet animals, rabbits, fur-bearing animals, pigeons, ducks, geese and turkeys) before they are exhibited to determine that the livestock and poultry show no clinical indications of contagious, infectious disease and ectoparasites.

G. Fair veterinarians **Must and will** reject any animal with infectious or contagious diseases or extoparasited. Exhibitors should be aware that **ringworm**, **warts**, **pink-eye**, **strangles**, **contagious exthyma**, **scabies**, **lice**, **mites**, **ticks and fleas** fall into those categories.

H. Animals exhibiting disease symptoms during the course of the fair may be rejected by the barn superintendent and the fair manager.

I. It is strongly recommended, but not required, that cattle be vaccinated in the current show year against respiratory disease.

J. All dogs must have parvoirus, DHLP, and rabies certificates. Washington State Law, January 2012, requires Dog, Cat and pet Ferrets to have current rabies shots. Proof of vaccinations required. Please send a copy with Fair entry.

K. The Fair veterinarian's professional decision as to the health status of an animal is final and shall be upheld by the fair board.

L. All breeding sheep, sheep over 18 months of age, and sheep and goats exhibited at fairs, shows, demonstrations and petting zoos must be identified with a USDA or Washington Scrapie Tag (or they will be rejected in accordance with the State Veterinarian's guidelines.)

M. The health and general welfare of all project animals are of concern to Wahkiakum County Fair Board & Management. **Minimum** veterinary requirements have been established. All animal exhibitors are strongly encouraged to take additional measures to further safeguard their animals health, as advised by their own veterinarian. The 4·H & FFA exhibitor assumes all responsibility for the health and welfare of his/her animal exhibit.

N. In all animal exhibits, medication can only be given with the approval of the department superintendent or appropriate asst. manager, except in an emergency situation or when administered by a veterinarian at the scene. It is not consistent with Washington State 4-H policy to administer any drug or medication that could affect the performance or disposition of the animal, resulting in an unfair advantage to the exhibitor or endangering the animal's well being.

O. All 4-H members who exhibit animal projects shall be responsible for the humane care and showmanship of their animal. Failure to comply may result in dismissal from the 4-H exhibit, and forfeiture of all premiums.

P. Fair management reserves the right to dismiss any animal showing signs of lameness, unsoundness, or stress from further participation, upon recommendation of the fair veterinarian.

Q. Animal Disease Diagnosis and Treatment, 4-H volunteers, as representatives of Washington State University are expected to act within the policies and guidelines of the 4-H youth Development Program. A 4-H animal science volunteer may educate members and their families in the normal course of their 4-H activities in the areas of animal care, production, and management. WSU volunteers are not to engage in activities that include the diagnosis or treatment of or the direct administration of medications to project animals without authorization from a licensed veterinarian. A 4-H volunteer may exercise commonly acceptable first-aid skills/practices in emergency situations.

OUT OF STATE ANIMAL REQUIREMENTS

A. All out of state animals going to fairs must have health certificates.

B. Entry permits are required for all out of state cattle and breeder and feeder swine.

For more information or questions call the Fairgrounds office at 795-3480. There is a copy of regulations for cattle. If there are any other questions contact State Veterinarian Dr. Leonard E. Eldridge at 360-902-1800.

SAFETY REQUIREMENTS

1. Exhibitors are expected at all times to care for, handle, exercise and exhibit their animals in a manner that will protect the animal, themselves and the general public from any hazard, accident or injury.

2. Teasing or harassing any live animal by anyone will not be permitted and will result in expulsion from Fairgrounds for duration of Fair.

3. Animals are expected to be exercised only in the areas designated by the barn superintendent(s). The superintendents will post rules in the barn specifying exercise time and intervals.

4. All colts and horses will be in box stalls.

5. All cattle must be dehorned, unless horns are a Breed Standard.

6. All cattle must be double-tied with rope not hay twine.

The purpose of the Youth Auction is to provide an incentive for youth to exhibit and sell quality stock (beef, sheep, swine, goat, poultry and rabbit) and non-animal items. The sellers (4-H/FFA members) and the bidders and/or buyers are reminded here that the price paid to the seller may not, in fact, reflect a true market price at the time of the sale. It is the desire of the sponsoring groups that the buyers of the animals featured in this sale, will bid sufficiently to cover the individual exhibitors additional expenses incurred in feeding, fitting and transporting the animals to this show

to gain experience in feeding and management of quality

The sale is sponsored by the Wahkiakum County Fair, and the WSU Cooperative Extension 4-H Youth Development Program.

The following rules have been set forth by the sponsors and shall be strictly enforced.

EXHIBITOR ELIGIBILITY

1. Each exhibitor must be enrolled in the Wahkiakum County 4-H Program and be actively caring for the animal(s) and/ or products exhibited as a project.

2. The Sale Committee, in an effort to deal fairly with all participants, has made a decision that members wishing to participate who have family obligations that require them to be gone from their primary residence during the school summer vacation, will be eligible if they are absent for not more than 3 weeks. In case of hardship or emergency The Market Sale Committee will review the circumstances.

3. Each exhibitor must complete a "Letter of Intent", (this letter is a commitment to sell at the auction) for each animal including backup animals and non-animal item. You can obtain a "Letter of Intent" from the Wahkiakum County Extension Office, your 4-H leader. The completed "Letter of Intent" must be returned to the Wahkiakum County Extension Office by May 1st for all large market sale animals; June 16th for poultry and rabbits and non-animal items. Animal entry forms, properly completed in accordance with division, class and lot numbers as given in this premium book are due to the Wahkiakum County Fair Office July 23.

4. Pre-fair weigh-in is **required** for beef, sheep, swine and goat. The weigh-in date is **June 10th**. The weigh-in is from 10 a.m. to 12 noon, at the Wahkiakum County Fairgrounds. Animals must be tagged, notched or tattooed by the weigh-in date or they will be so marked at the weigh-in. **The 10 a.m.** to **12 noon time frame will be strictly adhered to**.

5. Each exhibitor and/or seller assumes the responsibility for securing at least two buyers for each animal expected to be sold by the exhibitor.

6. Exhibitors will furnish names and addresses of the two buyers they have contacted by July 20 to the Extension Office.

7. All eligible youth are bound by general rules, livestock rules, 4-H rules and all other rules and regulations as listed in the Wahkiakum County Fair Book. It is the expectation of the Market Sale Committee that the sale animal will be in the care of the member from the date the animal is acquired for sale until after the Sale.

8. Non-animal items must be made in current 4H year and exhibited at the Wahkiakum County Fair.

9. All youth will be neat, clean and appropriately attired with their 4-H and FFA identification when taking pictures for buyer recognition and in the sale ring.

4-H / FFA AUCTION SALE REGULATIONS

1. The Sale Committee will inspect all animals for identification and proper weight at the weigh-ins. Large animals must be tagged, notched or tattooed by the June weigh in date or they will be so marked at the weigh-in. This June weigh-in date is for beef, lambs, goats and hogs. Poultry and rabbits will be weighed in August 15th, 3 to 4 p.m. at the fairgrounds. 2. All sale items will be judged in appropriate classes at the County Fair.

3. All animals must make USDA grade. a. Beef: minimum of 900 lbs. Must grade minimum USDA Select. Age 16 to 24 months.

b. Market Lambs: minimum of 90 lbs. (under 1 year). Must grade USDA Good and not have over $\frac{3}{4}$ " wool.

c.Market Goats: minimum of 45 lbs. (under 1 year). Must make USDA grade.*

d. Market Hogs: minimum of 190 lbs. (under 1 year). Must grade #1 or #2.

e. Rabbit fryers: minimum of 5 lbs. (14 weeks or under). pen of 3. Must make USDA grade.*

f. Poultry fryers: minimum of 5 lbs. (6-8 weeks or under) pen of 3. Must make USDA grade.*

g. Turkeys: one animal. Must make USDA grade.*

h.Geese: one animal. Must make USDA grade.*

i. Ducks: Pen of 3. Must make USDA grade.* Turkey, Geese and Duck weight to be determined by breed. *Grade to be determined by sale date.

4. All animals sold by the head or pen; non-animal items sold as judged. **Sale of production animals is allowed.**

5. All sales are final. Buyer may donate the animal to be sold again at the auction with the proceeds of the lowest sale going to help support the 4·H/FFA Auction Program. The highest price received for the animal goes to the member.

6. A fee of 10% goes to the Market Sale Committee to cover expenses for the sale. If an animal is resold, the proceeds of the lowest sale will go to the 4-H/FFA Auction Program and the Sale Committee will waive the 10% fee of the higher sale so the member will receive the total price of the original sale. **There will be only one resale per animal allowed.**

7. Proceeds of the sale will be distributed to the sale members after payment has been received from the buyer and the sale member has met all sale obligations listed on the Letter of Intent.

8. There will be an established selling order. Order within species is dependent on judged placing (champion, reserve, etc.)

9. Sellers of market beef must complete a bill of sale.

10. Sellers of market beef must furnish a rope and halter that may or may not be returned.

11. Beef may be steers or heifers. No bulls are allowed. Beef must be polled or dehorned.

12. Hogs, lambs and goats may be ewes, does, gilts, wethers or barrows and under 1 year of age.

13. Turkeys, geese and ducks must be born in current year. Members must certify date of birth with their project leader.

14. Market rabbits will be judged on : meat quality (40%), condition (30%), uniformity (20%), and general (10%). Final decision will be at the discretion of the rabbit judge.

15. Market animals must not be in partnership with a professional breeder. Animals owned by a 4-H club or family partnership shall be slated as such in the Auction Program. Proceeds from sale of animal(s) will be shared by the club or family partnership.

16. Sellers are responsible for the animals until the buyer removed the animal from the Fairgrounds. Animals for slaughter (beef, sheep and swine) will remain at the Fairgrounds until Sunday pick-up, unless prior arrangements are made with the Sale Committee.

17. Exhibitors, buyer and others may not buy animals for specific return of animal to the seller or to be shown at other shows and/or sale by exhibitor.

18. The following Washington State 4.H Youth Development Policy will be adhered to fully:

Animal Health and the Use of Illegal Substances

The use of illegal drugs and/or the improper use of animal health products or foreign substances will not be tolerated in the Washington State 4-H Youth Development Program. Extension personnel, 4-H volunteers, families, youth and fair/show officials have a legal and moral obligation not to misuse these products. We have the responsibility to tell others not to use these substances and to report those who do use any illegal substance. The administration of any drug of medication, which could affect an animal's performance resulting in an unfair advantage or the disposition of the animal, is unacceptable. Additionally, there are federal penalties for using illegal substances in animals that are going into the nation's food supply.

The show management reserves the right to test any Market Sale animals that will be processed.

PURCHASING OF STOCK AND RECOGNITION OF BUYERS

1. How stock can be purchased and how buyers can handle stock.

(a) Anyone can bid and purchase any steer, sheep, hog, goat or pen of rabbits or poultry at the sale.(b) All animals must be paid for at the time of sale.

2. What recognition will be made of buyers who purchase

animals at sale? (a) Each animal will have a place card displayed in such

a manner that the public can see animal and identify it with card.

(b) Card will bear the name of the person who showed and sold animal and the name of the person or firm who purchased the animal.

3. There shall be a press release after the sale for the purpose of recognizing the buyers for their support of this sale.

4. 4. H Youth are encouraged to develop a Sale promotional poster to be displayed in the local community.

5. Buyer may donate the animal to be sold again at the auction with the proceeds going to help support the 4-H Auction Program. The highest bid received for the animal will go to the member. (Please see Rule 16 above for further clarification.)

Department A 4-H CLUBS

4-H is an informal educational program for boys and girls between kindergarten and 19 years of age. It offers young people opportunities to develop new interests, make new friends, practice democracy and leadership, and have fun.

4-H leaders are supported in their efforts by the professional staff member of Washington State University Cooperative Extension.

The strength of the 4-H program lies in its volunteer adult and teen leaders, who are energetic, enthusiastic and dedicated to helping young people.

The Fair is the show window for 4-H programs.

4-H EXHIBITS

RULE 1.

General rules and regulations will apply to all entries in the 4-H section. Any animal used in the 4-H section cannot be used in open class except for group classes. RULE 2.

4-H record books are due at the Extension Office July 23, by 4:00 p.m. 4-H entries will not be accepted if book(s) is not approved. Entries will have to be made in open class. 4-H record book will be entered for premium points.

RULE 3.

To show or enter livestock such as dairy, beef, horses, goats, swine and sheep the exhibitor must be determined by the superintendent(s) and/or fair management to be in complete control and management of said animal.

RULE 4.

Dairy and livestock exhibitors in the 4-H section may show grade animals providing they show good breed characteristics.

RULE 5.

Exhibitors will be responsible for the care and feeding of their animals except if stated differently. Exhibitors must keep the premises and animals clean at all times.

RULE 6.

All animals in the 4-H section must meet the animal health requirements as outlined or those standards made by the fair management.

RULE 7.

Senior yearling heifers in milk must be entered and shown in the two-year old class.

RULE 8.

All 4-Her's will be classified in lots regarding grade for year prior to the fair as defined in 4-H rules (Primary 4-Her's kindergarten thru 2nd grade (not eligible to show large animals) junior-3, 4, 5 grade; intermediate-6, 7, 8, grade and senior 9 grade and above.

RULE 9.

Animal certificates must be on file in the Extension Office by April 16th for Market Steers. Dairy, Horses, and Breeding Beef are due May 1. Dairy Replacement Heifer Animal Certificates are due June 1st.

RULE 10.

 $4 \cdot H$ members shall exhibit only those articles or animals made or cared for during the current $4 \cdot H$ year. The $4 \cdot H$ year runs from October 1st. to September 30th with the exception of food preservation.

RULE 11.

4-H members shall exhibit or compete only in the project in which they are enrolled except as noted in the division rules. Exhibits must be different enterprise than FFA, FHA or school projects.

RULE 12.

4-H project exhibits may not be entered in open class, except under Rule 12 in the General Rules and Regulations.

RULE 13.

No bulls will be shown over 1 year of age.

RULE 14.

A 4-H member does not need to own his/her animal. However, it must be certified by the Wahkiakum County Extension that his/her animal has been his/her responsibility since the animal certificate due dates of the current year to be eligible for the fair. See rule 9 for certificates dates.

RULE 15.

No beef, dairy or animals with horns may be shown, except junior calves. Unless horns are a Breed Standard.

RULE 16.

Grooming of the project animal including herdsmanship must be performed by the 4-H exhibitor; this includes clipping and washing the animal. In cases where 4-H exhibitors are too young and/or physically incapable of doing their own clipping, only bonafide 4-H members may provide the needed assistance. Violations of this rule creates loss of learning experience to the exhibitor and unfair competition to the other members, particularly in the fitting and showmanship contests.

RULE 17.

All articles and animals regardless of competition will be judged DANISH (judged on it's own merits).

RULE 18.

Animals from same farm may be put together due to limited number of pens.

RULE 19.

All 4-H exhibitors showing animal projects must enter a fitting and showing class with their animal. Exhibitor's are not required to enter conformation, equitation or other



if you do not plan to show after you have made your entry. Note: Any exhibitor not participating in Fit & Show will be disqualified.

RULE 20.

The use of illegal drugs and/or the improper use of animal health products or foreign substances will not be tolerated in the Washington State 4-H Youth Development Program. Extension personnel, 4-H volunteers, families, youth, and fair/show officials have a legal and moral obligation not to misuse these products. We have the responsibility to tell others not to use these substances, and to report those who do use any illegal substance.

The administration of any drug or medication which could affect an animal's performance resulting in an unfair advantage or the disposition of the animal, is unacceptable. Additionally, there are federal penalties for using illegal substances in animals that are going into the nation's food supply.

The Fair Management reserves the right to test any Market Animals that may be processed, test champions and/or reserve champions, or test at random.

RULE 21.

Herdsmanship Regulations:

Good care of your animal is an important part of the privilege and responsibility of exhibiting in 4-H at the Wahkiakum County Fair. Because many more people see your animal in the barn than in the show ring, 4-H exhibitors are expected to maintian barn, feeding, and grooming conditions that insure good health and safety for the animals in their care and will show consideration and sensitivity toward the public visiting the Wahkiakum County Fair. Remember, as a 4-H member you are showing the public that you have learned

PRIMARY 4-H

Primary members will follow the same deadlines and rules as all other 4-H members, however they are not eligible to compete at the 4-H State Fair.

Still Life Exhibits:

Primary 4-H members will be eligible to enter in the 4-H Building, items made as part of the 4-H program. Members may enter as many items as allowed per class in the Fair Premium Book (no duplication). Point's for still life exhibits (including record books and educational exhibits) will equal red premium points in corresponding classes.

Animal Exhibits:

Primary 4.H members will be eligible to exhibit small animal (potbellied pig, pygmy goat, kinder goat, dog, cat, rabbit, poultry, cavy and pocket pet) projects. Primary members who exhibit their animals in the barns and who participate in fitting and showing and herdsmanship will do so on a non-competitive basis only. Primary members may enter under the class numbers and lots specific to the animal being entered but the entry must clearly designate the exhibitor is a Primary 4-H member. They will receive premium points to equal red premium point awards in the corresponding classes.

Other Primary Activities/Exhibits:

4-H activities such as demonstrations, judging contest, Foods For All Occasions, Fashion Revue, etc., are available to primary members only if the parent and leader feel they are capable. Primary 4-H members not eligible for pressure canning or hot water bath preserving.

WAHKIAKUM COUNTY FAIR 4-H HORSE BARN RULES

Violation of the following rules could result in disciplinary actions as follows: **In the 4-H Barn**, the 4-H member will be referred first to the 4-H leader, then to the Barn Manager, then to the 4-H horse superintendent, then to the 4-H Youth agent and/or Fair Manager depending upon the seriousness of the infraction. A first infraction will warrant a formal verbal warning from one or any of the above persons; a second infraction could result in your being asked to leave the Fairgrounds and forfeiture of all ribbons and premium points/monies.

The Fair Board will pay for only <u>five ribbons</u>, but you may enter as many events as you want. Premiums will be paid as follows:

- a. One award in fitting and showing.
- b. Four awards for the four highest ribbons.

There will be a mandatory orientation for $4 \cdot H$ horse exhibitors Wednesday evening. Time(s) will be available from the superintendent, fair office, and/or Extension office.

I. GENERAL RULES FOR 4-H:

1. No drugs or alcohol-use or possession.

2.No smoking is allowed anywhere in the horse barns or in the immediate areas surrounding the horse barns, including any areas of hay or feed storage in or around the horse barn areas. No use of tobacco products, including smokeless tobacco, by any 4-H member or anyone under the age of 21. (See Washington State Law.) 3. No dogs allowed unless it is a registered 4-H or Open Dog contestant, and then only on a leash in the approved dog areas.

4.No abuse of animals whether by the use of illegal tack (as defined by the 4-H Performance Horse Rules for 4-H Members) or be severe disciplinary actions that may endanger the horse and others in the area.

5.Only the 4-H member currently enrolled and entered in the Fair may ride the 4-H horse they are exhibiting in the 4-H division at Fair. No other 4-H member shall ride any one else's horse - whether permission was granted by the owner/parent/guardian or not. Ride only the horse you have entered in the Fair. If there are extenuating circumstances (i.e. 4-H member is hurt or ill) another 4-H member may ride or exercise as per 4-H horse superintendent decision.

6.Only exhibitors may groom, exercise or handle a horse, and then only the horse they have entered in the Fair. The only exception to this rule is the assistance given a 4-H member by a leader or another 4-H member, and then it can only be assistance, not the assumption of the task for the exhibitor. If an exhibitor is unable to groom, exercise, or handle their horse, they must speak to the Horse Superintendent to make other arrangements. Permission must be obtained prior to someone else assuming control of any horse.

7.A visibly ill, injured or lame horse may be excused from participation by show personnel. In the case of a 4-H horse, the leader should be notified first, then the 4-H Horse Superintendent, then possibly the Extension Agent or Fair Manager, depending on the circumstances. This is to protect the health and safety of the horse, not to penalize anyone. 8.No foul or vulgar language or obscene gestures will be tolerated.

9.No fighting, running or roughhousing will be tolerated in or in the immediate areas surrounding the Horse Barns.

10.No galloping or running horses of will be allowed at any time during Fair (except for Western Games). Control of your horse must be demonstrated at all times.

11. All horses must be exercised at the appointed times, unless the exhibitor is unable to do so. Any skipping of exercise time must be cleared prior with the appropriate superintendent. Failure to exercise or otherwise care for your horse could result in penalties as outlined above.

12. Exhibitors must wear boots with heels at all times when in stalls, on barn duty and when riding. Any leaders or helpers authorized to be in a stall or in horse staging areas on show days must also wear boots for their protection. **4-H horse members in all age groups will wear ASTM-SEI approved helmets in all riding classes and during exercise periods.**

13.All grooming and outfitting must be done in stalls. This includes hoof blacking.

14.No riding double. No riding bareback during exercise times without prior approval of appropriate horse barn superintendent.

15.All horses must be led at a walk to and from arenas. Horses may only be ridden in designated arena areas.

16. Only 4-H/FFAmembers enrolled and entered in the Fair may participate in "Fun Day" horse games.

17.No horse may be left unattended outside a stall; no horse may be left unattended tacked up in a stall. Check with Superintendents if tying in horse stall is needed.

18.Exhibitors are solely responsible to inspect their stall prior to putting horse in it to make sure it is safe and secure.

19.It is strongly recommended that all horses have current vaccinations 30 days prior to Fair.

20.Every horse must have a halter and lead rope/shank hung properly on the stall front.

21.Horses may not be removed from stalls without prior permission from appropriate superintendent except for during scheduled exercise and/or show days or official fair events/ activities. In regards to 4-H horses, prior permission must be obtained from the 4-H Barn Manager and/or 4-H Horse superintendent. Respective superintendents/barn manager will specify proper procedures for bringing out horses on show days and/or official fair events/activities.

22.Gate holds are for 3 minutes only on Show Day. Exhibitors requesting gate holds must be at the gate ready to enter at the end of 3 minutes.

23. No drugs may be used on any horse. However, 4-H horses may continue medication needed for therapeutic purposes, but prior approval must be obtained from the 4-H Horse Committee in communication with the 4-H Agent.

24.Any horse exhibiting unsafe behavior with potential to cause harm, may be removed by the Barn Superintendent after consultation with the Fair Manager, and in the case of

a 4-H Horse the 4-H Extension Agent.

25. If any 4·H member has a problem with any person, adult or otherwise, please immediately advise your leader, barn superintendent or the 4·H Extension Agent.

26. If you have a complaint, please follow the grievance procedures outlined in the attached 4-H Grievance Policy and/or the Fair Premium Book.

27. For the safety of the 4-H horse exhibitor and others, a tack check may be conducted prior to the exhibitor's first riding or driving event. Illegal, poorly fitted, or unsafe tack will be corrected before arena entry. Rubber bands on stirrups as a riding aid will not be allowed. Twine and other temporary repairs will not be allowed unless approved by the 4-H horse superintendent, depending upon severity. Once completing a tack check, modifying or altering tack without prior approval or communication to 4-H superintendent may result in forfeiture of right to participate in the remaining 4-H horse classes/lots.

II. PERFORMANCE HORSE CLASS RULES:

All classes conducted in this section will be in accordance with the Wahkiakum 4-H Horse Policy Guide; 4-H State Performance Horse-Member Manual and Class Rules--EM4727; and Hunt Seat and Jumper Manual-PNW 488 and EB 1974 4-H Horse Contest Guide. Proper tack for riding each seat is listed in the respective publications and/or policy guide. If a particular piece of tack is not listed, then it is not allowed in the Wahkiakum County 4-H horse program or at State 4-H Fair.

1. Walk/Trot--English or Western (Green Horse). *Not State Fair Eligible* Any junior, intermediate or senior exhibitor who is not yet ready to canter or lope. No cross-entering with canter classes. Riders who have cantered or loped previously in competition are not eligible to participate in this class.

2. Trail-The trail horse class will be set up in a designated area of the arena. The trail course will be available for 4-H exhibitors to compete from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. See Superintendent for details. No practicing on the course is allowed.

3. Green Horse Project-Not State Fair Eligible. Please refer to the 4-H publication "Training Yearlings to 5 Year Olds" for a full description of all four lots offered.

4. Dressage. The lot divisions will be by dressage level, not age of exhibitor. Each exhibitor may ride two tests. Exhibitors riding Intro Level tests may not ride another level, unless they are exhibiting in other canter classes. Tests must be specified on entry from following list: Intro Level, Test 1; Intro Level, Test 2; Training Level, Test 1, 2, 3, or 4; First Level, Test 1, 2, 3, or 4. Exhibitors may ride test from memory or they may have someone else call the test. Dressage will be judged using dressage standards, but ribbons will be awarded using the Danish System, and according to age groups. Exhibitors will receive a dressage score sheet and a ribbon. Riders may use western saddle. All riders are strongly encouraged to ride with a snaffle bit. Riders must ride with two hands.

5. Hunt Seat Equitation over Fences-State Fair Eligible only for those 4-H members who qualified in this class and respective lots at the county fair. Certain lots may not be state fair eligible (i.e. ground poles and crossrail). Only exhibitors pre-entered by the Extension office will be allowed to participate in State Fair. County 4-H exhibitors must have passed a Jumping Skills Checklist at the respective

heights in order to enter the corresponding heights listed i n the county fair premium book. The lot divisions will be by height, but ribbons will be awarded according to exhibitor age. Trotting will be allowed in class. The judge may require a hand gallop and the exhibitor should be able to execute this gait for their safety and the safety of others.

6. Hunter Hack over Fences, Walk/Trot classes. Not State Fair Eligible.

7. Fitting and Showing. In order to qualify for state fair, the equine used in performance, driving, western games, or equitation over fences must be the same animal used in fitting and showing.

This is an equitation class in which the rider performs maneuvers as a group, as a rail equitation class (i.e. no individual work).

Disciplined rail is a class that tests the skills of both the horse and rider, as they execute specific gaits, transitions, and/or movements as requested by the judge. The horse should do what the rider asks with the least possible effort on the part of the rider and the least amount of resistance from the horse. The member will be judged on correct posture, smooth gait transitions, and effective use of aids, with special emphasis on light hands. The performance of the horse is not to be considered more important than the methods used by the rider in otaining that performance.

The judge is encouraged to call for reasonable tests of horsemanship with the rider demonstrating overall equitation as related to seat and hands; performance; and member and appointments as per the Equitation division of the Pacific Northwest 4H Contest Guide, current edition.

This is not a game (i.e. "Simon Says") or an elimination/ out class.

Tack, Equipment, and Appointments: Same requirements as per the respective seats of the Equitation Division in the Pacific Northwest 4H Contest Guide, current edition.

The following are some, but not all, of the maneuvers the judge may ask you to perform:

Enter ring on right track

• Transitions to and from any gait, such as trot to canter, hand gallop to halt, halt to canter, trot to counter canter, etc. You may also be asked to perform a gait for a specific number of steps or strides.

- Extension and collection of any gait.
- Lope/canter on correct lead.
- Starting and traveling on the incorrect lead/counter canter.

• Hand gallop/extended canter/extended lope (depending on seat and/or number of exhibitors).

• Change leads--simple, interrupted, or flying (Example: "As you pass in front of the judge, perform a simple change of lead.")

Ride without irons/stirrups and drop and pick up irons/

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stirrups

 Haunch or forward turn (need forward motion), judge may ask for specific number of degrees

• Turn on forehand and turn on hind quarter (once each way).

• Leg Yield such as away from and back to the rail.

 Side pass both away from the rail (at least five steps) and then back to the rail.

- Transition from any gait to a balanced halt/stop
 Starting into a lope from a halt.
- Reverste at a jog/trot (but not at lope) Change of diagonals (English)
- Back
- Walk "on the buckle".






